## Wichita Falls Welcomes Seniors on E-bikes

August's cycling mega event, Hotter'N Hell Hundred (HHH), named the nation's best road cycling event in America last year, allows seniors to explore their new Electric bicycles' capacity for extended fun. Wichita Falls event organizers are happy to provide them equal access, only asking them to be careful.

Long-time HHH organizer Chip Filer says they do not mention e-bikes in their extensive documentation of the ride. The event invites their owners to participate with the caution that he expects those riders to be careful at the start and around the rest stops. He warns seniors not to let their powerful e-bikes slip out of control.

"With our aging population we are open here at Hotter'N Hell to accommodating cyclists who are switching over to e-bikes," Filer said in a phone interview. "Again, we just need them to realize those e-bikes can present control problems if the riders are not vigilant."

Since the Southwest has experienced hotter-than-usual temperatures in June, the Hotter 'N Hell 100 on August 23 in Wichita Falls, Texas, may see temperatures exceed its namesake. The main event sees more than 10,000 riders that Saturday, while the inspiring and challenging bicycle events

span four days from August 21st to the 24th. Electric pedal-assist motors reduce the Named the USA Today Readers' Choice for Best Road Cycling Event for 2024, this year the 44th-anniversary HHH was only second in the voting.

For the e-bike crowd, the event offers the most robust set of offerings in America. Most importantly, the four-day extravaganza of cycling is just a two-and-a-half-hour drive from OKC. The driving distance to Wichita Falls is 140 miles using I-44 through Lawton.

Many seniors have found that the surging-indemand e-bikes are great for allowing them to ride more and farther than they usually do. "Bicycling Magazine" rates 16 of them for their performance, value and ride quality in their June issue. Readers can observe how seniors are turning to cycling more with the help of a little electricity and a significant amount of money.

As the largest mid-summer century ride in the nation, the HHH is not just a ride; it's a unique spectacle that fosters a strong sense of cycling camaraderie. Participants, united by their love for cycling, brave the August heat in one of the best-supported bicycle rides, attracting over 13,000 riders and sometimes even more for the full four-day extravaganza.

The HHH website Hotter'N Hell offers plenty of info to help riders plan their adventure and make the most of their time at the event. The HHH stands out for its unwavering commitment to safety and support, making it our country's most robust century ride. They execute a comprehensive safety plan, including medical support and Support and Gear (SAG) assistance throughout the courses.

The 32-page Official HHH guide, available on the website, shares information that allows riders to focus on the ride and the fun, knowing they are well taken care of in any emergency. The event also offers shortermile courses with spacious rest stops for safety and comfort.

Don't let the 100 miles in the event name intimidate you. Several Oklahoma City seniors have done the 100 K ride on their E bikes and found it so much fun that they are planning on doing the same this year.

The ride is designed to be inclusive, offering shorter-mileage courses with spacious rest stops for safety and comfort. You will be welcomed with open arms, regardless of your experience level or age.



The event provides tent camping nearby, where riders stay in tents the Friday night beforehand. The Kay Yeager Coliseum has showers near the start/finish area for riders to use before heading home. This convenient option helps riders feel fully immersed in the experience, thanks to well-maintained facilities.

Whether they are a seasoned pro or a young enthusiast, there's a distance for everyone — from the challenging 100-mile route to the 10 K and 25-mile options for younger riders. This is not just a ride; it's a journey of personal achievement and camaraderie, where riders can push their limits and discover new strengths, earning a profound sense of empowerment and accomplishment.

Beginning Saturday at 7 a.m., cyclists of all ages and experience levels can embark on the classic HHH endurance ride of many distances.

The start of the ride is a highly anticipated event, staged with those riding the longest distances at the front. For some people, the start is a party where they line up and meet with friends, beginning as early as 5 a.m. for the 7 a.m. start. This early start time allows participants to beat the heat and enjoy the ride at their own pace.



The start is lively and exciting, with the National Anthem, a U.S. Air Force Fly Over, and a cannon blast marking the riders' beginning on journeys of 10K - 25-mile -50-mile -100K - 75-mile and 100-mile rides.

For those riding the middle distances, the start is just as exciting. Many say to

experience the excitement of starting a major organized ride, the best place to see it is at the HHH.

No matter how far seniors ride, it is about the camaraderie of riding along with thousands of other bicyclists who enjoy their lifelong sport. Cycling offers a tremendous health benefit without the overuse injuries associated with many other endurance sports.

## Adventurous Life Reviewed in Books

Richard T. Russ has lived an adventurous life from being an airline pilot to aerospace engineer to entrepreneur and author. Russ is the author of three books and 41 magazine articles.

His latest book "Life's Adventures," is about a young person that was an underachiever in high school that matured into a rocket system engineer in the launching of the historical Saturn V rocket that took Apollo 8thru Apollo 11 astronauts into outer space and enabled Apollo 11 astronauts to land on the moon.

Russ said his novel provides readers with continuing episodes that scholastically that some may have considered him as being a non-achiever to his careers that offered him the opportunity of becoming a history making engineer and entrepreneur.

"To be honest with you, every day's been exciting because there's always something going on," Russ said, who lives in Oklahoma City.

Russ graduated from Oklahoma State University in 1962.

"In 1962, my goal was to fly for the airlines, and I had an offer to work in 1963 for Continental in Los Angeles as a flight engineer, and went to work for them," he said.

Russ later took a job with North American Aviation Space and Information Systems Division, a NASA program.

"It was exciting because my job specifically was the stage pressurization and ground pneumatics, and I provided all of the pressurization for the Saturn and then, of course, the ground pneumatics to operate all the pneumatic systems," he said.

Russ later received an opportunity to return to Oklahoma to work as a project engineer for Aero Commander in Oklahoma City.

"I talked to my wife and she, being from Oklahoma, she would like to come back, so we came back to Oklahoma," he said. "I came here, and it was a great job here as a project engineer for Aero Commander."

He later went back to California to work for North America Rockwell and later finished his aerospace career as the Senior Engineer on the Space Shuttle Enterprise Approach and Landing Test to later become a successful entrepreneur.

"We had a small aircraft company here at Wiley Post Airport," he said. "I designed a door seal for general aviation and got that patented. We shut down the company after Covid, and then I started marketing that door seal. We had 140 different models that we certified with the FFA. At that point, a company came along out of Houston and said, 'We want to buy your company.' It was an offer that we could not turn down, and we could take care of ourselves for retirement, and so we sold the company."

Russ then got into restoring older Jaguar vehicles, and his restoration work won several national judging contest awards. His success with that caught the eye of Jaguar officials.

"My first book was at the request of Jaguar to write a book on the Series Three Jaguar E type," Russ said. "They asked me if I would write a judge's guide for them for competition, and so I said, 'I'll be glad to, and I did."

Russ's inaugural publication, titled "Jaguar V12 E Type: A Guide to Authenticity," aims to assist Jaguar E-Type sports car owners in restoring their vehicles to the prestigious standard of 100-point Concours d'Elegance winners.

Russ then followed up with his second book titled "They Call Me Tammie," which is about the life of a King Charles Cavalier Spaniel to be enjoyed by both young and old.

"I wrote a small children's book based on the day in the life of

our dog Tammie through her eyes," he said.

Russ said he does not have plans to write a third book.


"My wife has asked me not to. She said because it is so timeconsuming when I was writing and she didn't want that (again)," he said.

Russ is still busy with a variety of projects including helping design/fix model airplanes.

"There's a model airplane with which I am helping. I got in my model airplane to shop over here (in house)," Russ said. "I'm so busy doing things and my days are always involved."

Russ mentioned that he was fortunate to be in the right place at the right time when opportunities presented themselves.

"I've just been in the right places at the right time and doing things I wanted to do," he said. "There are some things a lot of people just dream about doing and I've gotten to do them in my life."



## Artists Interpret Vintage Antiques into Original Art

Oklahoma's most-viewed artist, legendary muralist and former University of Central Oklahoma art professor Bob Palmer, 74, is offering a one-of-a-kind opportunity for artists. This innovative event will not only provide a competitive platform for artists to showcase their work but also increase their visibility in the art world. It's a chance for seniors to see the talents of Oklahoma's artists in a whole new light.

On Friday, July 11, 10 artists will gather at 3 Strands Vintage Antique Mall, a 35,000-square-foot complex located at 4848 Northwest Expressway in Oklahoma City. Their mission is to create top-voted art using items available in the mall as the event runs from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. on July 11 and 12.

"It is not every day seniors get to witness artists creating, so this should be a special two days," Palmer said. "The best part, aside from witnessing artistry in person, is that each voter can provide feedback on the brilliance being created in front of them by voting on the top three new pieces."

These 10 artists will have the rare privilege of competing as they create new artworks using items selected from a vast array of unique and timeless treasures thoughtfully displayed across the vendors' booths in the well-curated complex.

"Here at 3 Strands Vintage (Antique Mall), we are so excited to host this event," said Cindy Gardner, mall owner. "All of our vendors spend so much time curating their inventory and can't wait to see it come to life." The mall is one of the largest of its kind in Oklahoma. Its massive size has drawn vintage enthusiasts and collectors alike. Mall management assures the competing artist that there will be plenty of objects they can interpret into their art pieces, well within the price range of the sponsorships outlined in the contest.

"It is novel and new that Oklahoma artists and sponsors are invited to apply to participate in a new form of art competition event," Palmer said. "The artist's mission is to reinterpret classic items of existing craftsmanship and artistry into new works of art. Mixed-media seen with new eyes as a novel assemblage can create stunning pieces, telling a story while providing new texture, dimension, color, and patina."

The objects the artists will interpret will be available from the mall's stock to spark the creativity. This opportunity to compete in the event is open to beginners and advanced mixed-media artists. Regardless of their age, skill level, or preferred medium, they will find exciting opportunities to increase their visibility in the art world. This event is designed to be inclusive, welcoming all artists and art enthusiasts to participate and enjoy the creative process.

Seniors are invited to watch the artists and vote on the top three creations. They can also take advantage of food trucks in the parking lot. Live music will be offered throughout each day, creating a vibrant atmosphere that ensures everyone feels engaged and part of the artistic process. One of the local television network's affiliates has already promised to attend both days to capture the artistry for segments to air later that evening on their broadcasts.

Depending on the size and medium, some artists will work inside, while others may create in the parking lot. Artists may bring mobile workshops if they plan to create art from their items in the parking lot.

already secured sponsorship. Those sponsors will have the first right of refusal to purchase the artist's creations, but the artist will set the price of each item.

If the artist determines that their creation is of more value than the sponsorship and the sponsor declines the first right of purchase, it will be available for sale to the public.

Sponsorships will range from \$500 to \$1000. Half of that amount will go to the artist, while the sponsor is rewarded with the work that the artist creates. The other half will be used to purchase items needed for the new artwork from vendor booths and a designated charity. This is a unique opportunity for sponsors to support local artists and receive a one-of-a-kind piece of art in return.

While watching the artists create art from objects that might have been considered single-purpose for decades, the voting process will be simple and accessible, encouraging everyone to participate.

Each visitor will receive a ballot upon entry, and they can cast their vote for their favorite artwork at any time during the event. The ballots will be tallied on Saturday, the 12th, to determine the winners.

Additionally, some of the funds will support the artists who receive the most votes from the public. The ballots tallied on Saturday, the 12th, will determine the winners, with the first-place artist earning \$300, the second-place artist \$200, and the third-place artist \$100.

The creative energy and excitement in this interpretive showdown should be palpable! All this artistic activity will likely inspire the public with countless ideas on how to create art from repurposed items


of great sentimental value to previous generations themselves.

Seniors will be free to interact with each artist throughout the two days. They can ask questions about inspiration, form, function, design, and color. This unique opportunity may inspire budding artists to try this mixed-media art form for themselves.

"This new type of competition is aimed at celebrating not just the artists' talents but also the vibrant arts culture within Oklahoma, encouraging everyone to partake in the joy of creativity and innovation," Palmer said.

**Dear Savvy Senior** 

Who's Eligible for Social Security Disability Benefits?

What do I need to do to get disability benefits from Social Security? I'm 60 years old and have a medical condition that doesn't allow me to work at my job anymore, but I've read that getting disability benefits is very difficult.

Need Help

#### Dear Need,

Getting Social Security Disability Insurance benefits (SSDI) when you're unable to work can indeed be challenging. Each year, approximately 2 million people apply for SSDI, but around two-thirds of them are denied, because most applicants fail to prove that they're disabled and can't work. Here are some steps you can take that can help improve your odds.

#### Are You Disabled?

The first thing you need to find out is if your health condition qualifies you for Social Security disability benefits.

You generally will be eligible only if you have a physical or mental impairment severe enough that it prevents you from working in your current, or past line of work, for at least a year.

There is no such thing as a partial disability benefit. If you're fit enough to work part-time, and you're earning more than \$1,620 (\$2,700 if you're blind) a month on average in 2025, your application will be denied. But, if you're not working or are working but earning below those limits, your application may be considered.

Your skills, education and work experience are factors too. Your application will be denied if your work history suggests that you could perform a less physically demanding job that your disability does not prevent you from doing.

To help you determine if you're eligible, use the SSA Benefit Eligibility Screening Tool at SSAbest.benefits.gov.

#### How to Apply

If you believe you have a claim, your next step is to gather up your personal, financial and medical information so you can be prepared and organized for the application process.

You can apply either online at SSA.gov/disability or call 800-772-1213 to make an appointment to apply at your local Social Security office, or to set up an appointment for someone to take your claim over the phone.

The whole process lasts about an hour. If you schedule an appointment, a "Disability Starter Kit" that will help you get ready for your interview will be mailed to you. If you apply online, the kit is available at SSA.gov/ disability/disability\_starter\_kits.htm.

It currently takes six to eight months from the initial application to receive either an award or denial of benefits. The only exception is if you have a chronic illness that qualifies you for a "compassionate allowance" (see SSA.gov/compassionateallowances), which fast tracks cases within weeks.

If Social Security denies your initial application, you can appeal the decision, and you'll be happy to know that roughly half of all cases that go through a round or two of appeals end with benefits being awarded. But the bad news is, with a huge backlog of people waiting, it can take another eight to 10 months or longer to appeal the decision, and another 15 months to get a hearing if reconsideration is denied.

#### Get Help

You can hire a representative to help you with your Social Security disability claim. By law, representatives can charge only 25 percent of past-due benefits up to a maximum of \$9,200 if they win your case.

It's probably worth hiring someone at the start of the application process if your disability is something difficult to prove such as chronic pain. If, however, your disability is obvious, it might be worth initially working without a representative to avoid paying the fee. You can always hire a representative later if your initial application and first appeal are denied.

To find a representative, check with the National Organization of Social Security Claimants' Representatives (nosscr.org) or National Association of Disability Representatives (nadr.org). Or, if you're low-income, contact the Legal Services Corporation (lsc.gov/find-legal-aid) for free assistance.

Edmond, OK 73012 A new law to curb the growing threat of cryptocurrency ATM fraud is • Clearly displaying terms and conditions before a transaction, now law in Oklahoma. Authored by Sen. Darrell Weaver, R - Moore, and Rep. Mark Lepak, R - Claremore, Senate bill 1083 introduces vital consumer protections to help prevent Oklahomans, especially older adults, from falling victim to cryptocurrency ATM-related scams, also known as digital asset or bitcoin kiosks.

Cryptocurrency ATMs look like bank ATMs and allow people to conduct legitimate cryptocurrency transactions. However, they can also be used to carry out fraudulent activity. Scams involving cryptocurrency ATMs are on the rise. In 2024, the FBI logged more than 10,956 complaints nationwide about these kiosks, with \$246.7 million stolen. Oklahomans alone lost \$37.7 million to cryptocurrencyrelated scams, including scams related to cryptocurrency ATMs.

"Older Oklahomans should not have to worry about criminals stealing the savings they worked so hard to accumulate for retirement," said AARP Oklahoma Volunteer State President Charlie Swinton. "This legislation provides common-sense protections that will help prevent criminals from using cryptocurrency ATMs to steal from unsuspecting residents, especially older Oklahomans who are often targeted."

Senate Bill 1083 provides numerous safeguards to prevent criminals from using cryptocurrency ATMs to steal, including:

 Imposing daily transaction limits to avoid potential risks associated with higher transactions.

· Posting fraud warning notices that are visible and identifying steps people should take if they suspect fraudulent activity.

including any fees and the exchange rate.

 Giving receipts with relevant transactional information, which allows law enforcement to investigate immediately.

· Providing a refund for new customers who are victims of fraud if they report it within 14 days of the transaction to the police and kiosk operator. · Requiring digital asset kiosk operators to refund kiosk fees for fraudulent transactions related to fraud.

Authorizing the Oklahoma Banking Department to require licensure in the state of Oklahoma; oversight of complaint activity and revocation of operator licensure if operators are subject to two or more consumer complaints related to fraudulent transfers that are not reimbursed.

"This bill is an important step in safeguarding our residents and ensuring that digital assets empower, rather than endanger, our citizens," said AARP Oklahoma Advocacy Director Joy McGill. "AARP applauds our Oklahoma legislature for taking bold action and standing up for consumer safety."

AARP Oklahoma partnered with the Oklahoma Bankers Association and had the endorsement of the Oklahoma County Sheriff Tommie Johnson and the Oklahoma County Sheriff's Department to gain passage of Senate Bill 1083. The bill will go into effect Nov. 1, 2025.

# John Doucette – one of classic film's great character actors

Released 60 years ago this year, "The Sons of Katie Elder" is often cited as a favorite amongst John Wayne fans. In addition to the delightful screen chemistry between Wayne and co-star Dean Martin as lead actors, the cast is littered with beloved classic film character actors including Paul Fix, James Gregory, Strother Martin, Rhys Williams, and John Qualen.

And John Doucette. With his deep, rich, distinctive voice and rugged features, Doucette was a prolific supporting actor in over 140 movies and even more television roles from the 1950s to the 1980s. Though he played a good-natured character in "Katie Elder" and his commanding screen presence made him a natural fit for roles like the town sheriff, a military man, or cop, he was also frequently cast in menacing henchman roles.

"He was kind of an intense guy, but sure was a neat dad," said his oldest son, also named John Doucette, from his home in Los Angeles. "He could be very strict at home when it came to things like schoolwork, but he also had a wonderful sense of humor – having 8 children you'd have to! There was always something going on at home, a lot of socialization with people in and out, so growing up was quite an adventure."

While the demands of his profession sometimes kept him busy at the studio for long hours or on location for weeks, John says his dad was a genuine family man.

"He was always right there with his video camera recording every event, whether it was my boy scouting, my younger brother's football games, or my sister's or daughter's softball games," said John. "When he was in Italy for several months filming 'Cleopatra' in the 60s, my mom and oldest sister – who attended school while there in Rome – went over to live with him. I have stills that the set photographer gave to my father while filming."

But when in Hollywood, Doucette would hurry home, occasionally still in makeup. "I remember after shooting an episode of 'Wagon Train' where his character was whipped, he came home with all the makeup marks for the lashes still on his back."

Unlike major box office stars who always commanded huge salaries, supporting actors made far less money. They made up for it, at least partially, by accepting numerous roles. In 1958, for example, Wayne appeared in just 3 films whereas Doucette is listed in over a dozen as well as more than 15 television appearances.

"That was fine by him, whatever came his way," said John. "He was a true perfectionist and I remember going over lines with him because he would study diligently for every part, no matter how large or small the role. Supporting players are just as important as the main star because without them you don't have a story. He really brought a lot to a scene, but then I'm a little biased! He was my dad and I loved him dearly."

"It's not a lot, but every month there are checks coming in and for Christmas it has always been distributed amongst the 8 children," says John who is a trustee of that account. "He died in 1994 but to this day he's still getting paid for all his hard work!"


